

Sonnet 55 (of 154): Not marble nor the gilded monuments

By William Shakespeare

1564 - 1616

1st quatrain

Not marble nor the gilded monuments

Of princes shall outlive this powerful rhyme,

But you shall shine more bright in these contents

Than unswept stone besmeared with sluttish time.

2nd. quatrain

When wasteful war shall overturn,

And broils root out the work of masonry,

Nor Mars his sword nor war's quick fire shall burn

The living record of your memory.

3rd quatrain

'Gainst death and all oblivious enmity

Shall you pace forth; your praise shall still find room

Even in the eyes of all posterity

That wear this world out to the ending doom.

concluding couplet

So, till the Judgement that yourself arise,

You live in this, and dwell in lovers' eyes.

Use a pencil on the printed poem in the first 4 tasks.

1. Mark four quatrains, and one couplet.
2. Mark the end rhyme pattern: ABAB CDCC EFEF GG
3. Mark stressed syllables with a line above and unstressed syllables with a bow, and after each foot make a vertical line.
4. Mark alliterations (bogstavrim, dvs. når den same lyd i starten af et ord kommer i flere ord tæt på hinanden).
5. Now in pairs listen to Sir Patrick Stewart's reading of the poem a couple of times.
6. Then in pairs take turns reading one line each of the Sonnet in 3 different manners:
 - a: You exaggerate the da-DUM da-DUM da-DUM da-DUM of the iambic pentameter.
 - b: You read as fast as you can while still making it understandable
 - c: You read copying the tone and pronunciation of Sir Patrick Stewart (The King's English).
7. If you have time discuss what makes this poem special.
